

The BEATs are at the heart of all we do at Kingsdown school; students are **taught** about the BEATs though peer education, assemblies and the tutor programme. They form the basis of our character education: this is **caught** through the role-modelling of the BEATs by our staff and students. The BEATs are also **sought:** we provide our student with a number of opportunities to put the BEATs into action every day from in their lessons, beyond their lessons and in the wider school community. We reward students' attitude, engagement and achievement through the BEATs.

Our BEATs not only provide our students with character education and a moral guidance, but they provide life skills which enhance any application for college and jobs in the future.

A Rights Respecting School:

Kingsdown School is becoming a Rights Respecting School this means:

- Our students learn about rights
- Our students learn **through** rights
- Our students are the ambassadors for the rights of others



As part of being **educated** about what rights all children should enjoy, our students and staff have the opportunities to **model** these rights each and every day through demonstrating our **BEATs** (character education). Moreover, our students have the opportunity to reflect on the impact these rights have on them and others in the world, as well as the impact of not all enjoying these rights.

Our students also have the opportunity to take a greater role in learning **about** rights in becoming a **peer educator** on rights to younger students.

They also have the opportunity to join the **steering group** which will create resources to educate as well as run campaigns to highlight local and national issues. This ensure that as a school we are ambassadors **for** the rights of others.



Student Leadership: Structure

Our student leadership programme allows students from all year groups to take an active role in the school, its development and decision making. From year 7 to year 11 there are opportunities to be involved. All students have the **BEAT award** which they can work towards as well as **leadership programmes** they can join to develop leadership skills. All students can put themselves forward to be on the **year** or **school council**. Even if they are not successful they can put their ideas forward in **tutor discussions** to have their voice heard.

Student Leadership: School council

Article 12 of the UNCRC says every child has the right to express their views, feelings and wishes in all matters affecting them, and to have their views considered and taken seriously.



At Kingsdown School we take this right of all our young people seriously in lessons, beyond lessons and in the wider community. One of our vehicles to ensure our students have a clear voice and are consulted in all things is our **school council**. The school council is led by our **head students** and involves **2 students from each year group** as well as representatives from **Champions of Change** group, **Here to Hear** prefects, and our **Rights Respecting steering group**. There are a number of sub groups from the council who put into action council ideas such as our **charity group** and **eco group**.

Our **student leaders** set the agenda for every cycle, they **chair the meetings** and **take recommendations to SLT**. Following actioning by SLT this is **fed back** to all students. There are **6 cycles a year:** 1 per term.





Student Leadership: Groups

There are also a number of groups our students can join to develop their leadership skills and take a larger role within our school community.

Champions of Change Yr 7-11

This group, which is led by head students, takes a role in educating and celebrating diversity. They have led assemblies and created resources for the student bulletin. Some members also represent the group on the school Equality Diversity and Inclusion group chaired by the Chair of Governors.

Prefects Yr 9-11

These students apply for the position of prefect and as part of this role they undertake duties on a weekly basis, support at evening events and go into tutor groups to work with younger students and support them by hearing them read.



Here to Hear Yr 9-11

This group which is led by head students promote anti-bullying in school. They have been involved in assemblies and anti-bullying messaging as well as undertaking a lunch or break duty where they are available to listen to and support all students in school. They are safeguarding and anti-bullying trained and have undertaken mental health training.



Our group of peer educators, led by our head students, have written lessons and trained others to deliver the BEATs, Rights Respecting education and anti-bullying education. They have then gone into tutor groups and delivered these lessons to younger students in school.



Student Leadership: Extra-curricular



We provide a number of opportunities for students to be involved with from year 7 to year 11 and we encourage students from all year groups to be actively involved in leading their school. As such we have a number of leadership courses which are run as extra-curricular opportunities for students to develop the vital leadership skills.

Year 7 - Transition Ambassadors / Peer educator

Year 7 students can put themselves forward to be transition ambassadors or peer educators. Students develop skills comprising of group work skills, decision making, leading others and collaborative work. This leads to students supporting Year 6 students on their transition days.



Year 8 - Sports leaders

This builds on what students have done as transition ambassadors and on the aspiring leaders course. This allows students to refine their communication, planning and leading others skills. As part of this they will run sporting events for younger students.



Year 9 - Becoming leaders

Building further on students taking responsibility, this is preparing students to be prefects, peer educations, drawing on interpersonal skills as well as public speaking.




Year 10 - Senior leaders

The year 10 programme is aimed at supporting students stepping up to being a head / senior students. This programme supports skills to run meetings, organise others, lead assemblies and publically speak.

Student Leadership: BEAT Award

Our BEAT award is the highest award we give as a school as this rewards students for all they do to put the BEATs into action inside the classroom, beyond the classroom and in the wider community. There is a different award for each year group which references the different opportunities available as well as progression from one year to the next.

Over the year students will have opportunities for drop down mornings. These mornings allow for students to experience:



Our Library



The library at Kingsdown School is open to all students and staff during breaks and lunch times. Here we provide a 'Quiet Room' for those students wishing to escape the hustle and bustle of secondary school, read or to complete homework, and a 'Social Room' for those who want to play board games or just relax and talk with their friends. Chess has been a particular favourite, with students often challenging (and occasionally beating) staff members.

To support students' reading we use a programme called Accelerated Reader; a tried and tested piece of software that enables students to choose from over a thousand fictional books, which have been carefully organised according to their level of difficulty. Accelerated Reader allows staff to monitor and track students' reading progress, as every book has a quiz attached, which students can access by logging onto their own Accelerated Reader account. Our goal is for every student to be reading. Now, with Accelerated Reader on students' Chromebooks, the opportunity for further quiz taking and reading progress at home has been made possible.

Every year, Kingsdown School participates in the Swindon Youth Literature Festival. For one week each year, authors from around the country come into schools to speak to students about writing, getting their work published and life as an author, before showcasing their work.

The festival also includes trips to the Wyvern Theatre and a secondary school book quiz, where students from each school meet and compete.



Careers opportunities

Careers education, support and guidance plays a significant role for students throughout their time at Kingsdown. All students have careers lessons as part of their Personal Development curriculum and they have access from career pilot from year 7 onwards. As part of this programme students are exposed to talks from a variety of employers as well as post 16 and 18 options including technical education and apprenticeships.


